#### CEREBROSPINAL MI

**I**HE child complains that his throat is sore. Mother feels his hands, his fore-head; he seems feverish. Something must be done. But just to put the child to bed and keep him there to see what develops is not enough. The right thing to do is to have a doctor examine the child immediately, because so many serious infections begin with "just a sore throat and a fever." One of the most dangerous diseases of childhood-cerebrospinal meningitis-may start this wav.

Four years ago the doctor would have said:"Cerebrospinal meningitis is a deadly disease; the chances for recovery, even with the best-known treatment, are slight.

But in these four years medical knowledge has brought proof that the miracle drugs, sulfanilamide and sulfapyridine. have saved many lives from destruction by the meningitis germ. Today the doctor can say: "The chances for recovery from cerebrospinal meningitis are good if the disease is recognized early and the proper treatment given.'

THE world has suffered many outbreaks of cerebrospinal meningitis. In 1929, parts of this country had alarming epidemics of the disease. And now, in 1941, we must be on guard against it because of the menace parts of Europe now present. Cerebrospinal meningitis was more prevalent in Europe during 1940 than at any previous time for which records are available.
