- Professional licensure





Background of First, Too FG Faculty Initiative

Background of First, Too FG Faculty Initiative



As part of Monmouth University's commitment to creating an inclusive, affirming, and equitable campus community, the <u>Office of the</u> <u>Provost</u> and <u>Intercultural Center</u> launched a new Diversity Innovation Grant (DIG) pilot program in the Spring of 2021 to provide encouragement and financial support to members of the campus community who want to take an active role in our shared commitment.

- June 2022-applied for grant
- Awarded \$10,000 for Fall 2022-Spring 2023 Implementation
- June 2023 reapplied for grant
- Awarded \$10,000 for Fall 2023-Spring 2024 Implementation
- As of Fall 2024 First, Too has become a sustained program
